Professor Kenelm Hutchison Digby



Professor Kenelm Hutchison Digby, OBE, MBBS (Lond), FRCS (Eng), was born on 4 August 1884. He was the first holder of the Chair of Anatomy of the Faculty of Medicine, The University of Hong Kong from 1913 to 1923. At almost the same time he was also the Ho Tung Professor of Clinical Surgery from 1915 to 1945, and then appointed Professor of Surgery of the University from 1923 to 1945. He was finally conferred the title of Emeritus Professor of Surgery from 1950, a title which he held until his death on 23 February 1954.

During his tenure in the University, Professor Digby was a dedicated teacher, a fine surgeon, and was a great gentleman to all who knew him.

It was to encourage the study and advancement of surgery and to pay tribute to this great man that a fund was raised and donated to The University of Hong Kong by past medical graduates in Hong Kong, Malaysia and Singapore to perpetuate the memory of Professor Digby in the form of a Gold Medal, the Digby Memorial Gold Medal, awarded to students who are in their final MB examination scored at their first attempt the highest marks in Surgery; and to invite a speaker of eminence to deliver the Digby Memorial Lecture.

Digby Memorial Lecturer

Dr W S W Ho



Dr William Ho trained as a general surgeon and is a Fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons (Edinburgh), the College of Surgeons of Hong Kong, and the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine. He is also a member of the Medical Council of Hong Kong.

With the establishment of the Hong Kong Hospital Authority in 1990, he pursued a career in healthcare management and obtained his Master of Health Administration (New South Wales). Demonstrating his superior leadership capabilities in a series of senior management positions within the Hospital Authority Head Office, Dr Ho was appointed Hospital Chief Executive of Kwong Wah Hospital. Over the following four years under his helm, he successfully transformed the management, facilities and culture of the hospital and its personnel, leading to very significant improvements in services. He also became Chairman of the Hong Kong Society of Health Services Executives.

In 1999, Dr Ho was appointed Chief Executive of the Hospital Authority, where he took charge of 44 public hospitals comprising of around 28,000 beds and 50,000 staff. Faced with the immense challenge to overhaul the deployment of its resources and to ease the problem of overloading to its system, he led the organisation through successfully implementing major reforms that streamlined the management structure and rationalised services - resulting in reduced wastage and a much improved public service.

In recognition of his significant contributions to the public healthcare of Hong Kong, Dr Ho was awarded Fellowship of the Hong Kong College of Community Medicine, the Faculty of Public Health Medicine (UK), and the Royal Australasian College of Medical Administration. He is also an Honorary Fellow of the Australian College of Health Service Executives.
